Access to water and toilets means:

Girls around the world spend

152 million hours

every day collecting water for their families.



Girls would have more time available to attend school.

526 million women and girls

have no choice but to suffer the indignity of defecating in the open.



Women and girls will have what they need to stay healthy with the dignity and privacy they deserve.

38% of healthcare facilities

in developing countries lack access to water, 19% don't have access to improved toilets, and 35% don't have water and soap for handwashing.



Survival rates would increase by 44% among newborns as a result of health care workers and moms being able to wash their hands.

315,000 children under-five die every year

from diarrheal diseases caused by dirty water and poor sanitation.



Diarrheal deaths would decrease by over 30%.

The global economy loses \$260 billion each year

from reduced productivity and health care costs associated with illness due to unsafe drinking water, poor sanitation, and inadequate hygiene practices.



An estimated return of \$220 billion to the global economy annually.

Promoting Global Access to Water, Sanitation and Hygiene

Why #GirlStrong?
